#### President's Corner

One hundred seventy members enjoyed ILEAD's Annual Meeting on May 19, 2009, at the Lake Morey Inn. The social hour was spent lakeside and everyone present enjoyed the sunny spring weather. Lunch was delicious and our speaker, Brian Kennedy, Director of



the Hood Museum, shared "Museum Musings: What Really Happens Behind the Scenes?" Assistant Provost Mary-Ella Zietz offered greetings from the College. The complete text of her remarks are at the right in the Provost's column. Brian Kennedy

The Summer Lecture Series topic is "Media in Crisis." Because of construction associated with Dartmouth's new Arts Center, Spaulding Auditorium is not available to us this year. We have been fortunate to secure the use of Hanover High School's beautiful, newly-renovated auditorium which seats about 450 people. Series tickets will be available on a first-come first-served basis.

The Planning Committee reported in the Winter/Spring Newsletter that the Feasibility Study Interviews were about to be conducted with selected ILEAD members to see if ILEAD could raise funds to obtain a home of our own. The purpose of these interviews was to determine whether or not ILEAD had:

An urgent and compelling case for support

Volunteers willing to take on leadership roles in a capital campaign

Donors and probable donors to invest in ILEAD's future

Development of infrastructure and resources to support a campaign effort

Interviews began in March. The Yellow Brick Road consultants presented their report to the Executive Council in May.

Briefly, the consultants concluded that while ILEAD members are enthusiastic about ILEAD as a whole, in the current economy ILEAD would be unable to raise sufficient funds for the project as conceived. They offered several recommendations, including:

Strengthen ILEAD's relationship with Dartmouth

Transform the governance structure

Hire an Executive Director Plan for the 20<sup>th</sup> and 25<sup>th</sup> anniversaries

Research available facilities

Revise the case for support to include program as well as facilities planning

Develop campaign leadership and volunteers

With Dartmouth's support, start an annual fund

We have already begun to address some of the recommendations. An ad hoc Committee on Governance has been created with Gerry Jones as Chair. That Committee's intention is to have a draft report complete by fall. Next year will be busy as we work on the rest of the recommendations.

Full report of the Feasibility Study is available from the ILEAD office staff.

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It was in January 2007 that the committee first considered a trip to Egypt. Five travel companies gave us proposals and we selected Odyssey International, which had previously worked with ILEAD. Because of family connections in Egypt and frequent trips to the area, I was nominated to lead the trip.

Eighty people attended the informational meeting at the Great Room in Kendal! We felt that forty would be the maximum, and forty people placed deposits. Gradually there was some attrition, due, basically, to the downturn in the economy. Twenty-seven very compatible people made the trip and had a fabulous time.



There were three meaty courses for this trip. In spring, 2008, the first course covered 3000 years of ancient Egyptian history. In the fall, the second course covered the next 2000 years. And, in winter, 2009, we studied Contemporary Egypt.

We had an outstanding trip guide, Mr. Tarak Morsy, who was with us for the entire time in Egypt. He took care of all the day-by-day details and arranged for the many extras we enjoyed. Imagine camel rides at the Great Pyramids, sailing on the Nile on picturesque fellucas in Aswan and Luxor, early morning balloon rides in Luxor, extra trips to mosques, the chance to meet the U.S. ambassador to Egypt, and wonderful meals at authentic restaurants. It was clear that Tarak enjoyed our company. He told us he never had a group that was so well-prepared!

#### Curriculum

We continue to pull together a richly diverse collection of courses, thanks to so many talented and creative course instructors. Enrollment this spring totaled 726, with 27 regular and 11 mini courses. The popularity of "Glorious Gardens" led Barbara Stern to teach this course in two sections. Examples of our continued diversity included "Food and Eating," which discussed the anthropology of food, and a course that explored Frank Lloyd Wright's buildings and clients. And, timely with

our economic woes, students learned the role played by the Federal Reserve. Music, history, literature, religion – we are fortunate to be able to provide this broad spectrum of subjects.

Our fall program is brimming with opportunities as we are offering 55 full and eight mini courses. Here's just a sampling: explore the history of the Northwest Passage, learn about Thirteen Books that changed America, or how to Eat Soup with a Knife.

All available teaching spaces have been overflowing with members and course leaders, as we have three scheduled classes during most days. Lisa continues to work miracles to find teaching spaces as we continue to increase the number of courses offered.

In addition to seeking study leaders, the Curriculum Committee is making a concerted effort to maintain and strengthen the quality of the courses. We are tackling this on a number of fronts. We have redesigned the evaluation form to highlight your comments. We have held a workshop in Dartmouth's DCAL facility to explore newer teaching technologies and methods.

We will continue to mine lessons learned and shared at study leader briefings. And we will continue to provide mentoring and courses on how to give an ILEAD course. We would welcome thoughts from the membership on how we can continue to help improve course quality. Please contact me or any member of the Curriculum Committee.

First, a huge thanks to Pam Ahlen for her years of producing this outstanding newsletter and a warm welcome to our new editor, Janet Schoeler!



## From the Editor


#### Japanese Death Poetry?

Why would a group of mostly senior citizens take a course on Japanese Death Poetry: the end-life poems of monks, poets, ordinary men and women expressed in three lines of roughly 17 syllables? What was our fascination?

We came to the course with divergent backgrounds. One participant had lived in Japan. Another's father was with the U.S. Navy at Nagasaki. Another's friend has lived in Japan for many years. One participant practices Buddhism. And for others the answer was curiosity, a desire to learn something completely new. Other participants had enjoyed exploring diverse topics with the same study leader. All of us seemed to have a fascination with haiku. And all of us had the willingness to discuss life within the context of death.

The course was so much more than death and dying, so much filled with life: a course that incorporated the perfect combination of verse and conversation, history and religion, creativity and discourse. And to securely hold these threads of experience together we had an experienced study leader in Patricia Norton, who has the remarkable ability to effectively explore a

topic that would take us off the Western path – the very reason why ILEAD is a success and so many of us keep coming back for more. A



Was this course depressing? Absolutely not! It was filled with life and energy, one of the reasons why I will continue to take ILEAD courses and volunteer in some capacity for the organization which has made such a profound difference in my own life.
