Then back to West Germany for 5 years, where they served in Bonn and where Jerry participated in the Four Power Agreement on Berlin, which ultimately led to the recognition of East Germany. When the treaty (known as the "Berlin Agreement" even though Berlin is never mentioned by name in the treaty) took effect in 1973, it recognized both Germanys, and each was then represented at the United Nations. Most historians recognize this as the beginning of the end of the Cold War and a new period in East-West relations which came to be known as détente.

Back again in Washington, things were changing at the State Department. It had been decided that married couples serving together was a problem, and a directive was sent out stating that one spouse would have to resign. (This was generally interpreted to mean that the wife would need to resign). Evangeline decided that this would be a perfect time to take the Foreign Service Exam and join in 1978. A joint posting to Bern, Switzerland followed, then back to Washington. She was assigned to Nicaragua at the State Department, where she served as Desk Officer during the Reagan administration. She found the assignment frustrating and decided to run for - and win - the post of vice president of the American Foreign Service Association, the professional association of the Foreign Service that represents over 15,000 members. She spent several years in this role, and then both she and Jerry were posted to Italy, where he was head of the U.S. Mission to the U.N. agencies in Rome, and she was a political officer to the Italian government. She describes her job loosely as, "reporting on the activities of the Communist Party in Italy."

It was now 1989, and a couple that had watched from a ringside seat the beginning of détente was now about to watch the slow motion collapse of the Soviet Union. Suddenly, political attachés from Poland were calling, and those Soviets serving in Rome were quite anxious to meet. It was the perfect time to wind down a lifetime in the Foreign Service, so they returned to Washington, where Jerry's last post was working with the United Nations' food programs. Evangeline retired 2 years later, and they moved to Woodstock, VT in 1999.

In 2000 they joined ILEAD, where they have taught the following classes: German history, diplomatic history, the European Union, the decline of the American middle class, US immigration, and an exploration of anti-Semitism.

Thank you, Jerry and Evangeline, for all you've given our members!

Pilot Program for Retirees

n an effort to grow its membership, OSHER@Dartmouth has embarked on an experimental program to offer a one-year free membership to new retirees from partner organizations. 

Address to Attendees of SLS by Dartmouth President Phil Hanlon

The following are excerpts from the transcript of the speech delivered by Dartmouth President Phil Hanlon at the July 27 session of the OSHER@Dartmouth 2017 Summer Lecture Series.

ood morning. On behalf of everyone at Dartmouth, it's a pleasure to welcome you to this very special event as part of the 20th annual Summer Lecture Series presented by OSHER@Dartmouth.

One of the greatest lessons we seek to instill in all who come to Dartmouth is a passion for lifelong learning, and nowhere is that passion more evident than at Osher.

Each year, thousands of Upper Valley residents take part in the exceptional educational programming offered through Osher, from courses, to social events and excursions, to outstanding

lectures like this one.

So, I'd like to begin by thanking our newly appointed President of Osher, John Sanders, who will be moderating today's discussion, as well as John Ferries and Pete Bleyler, co-chairs of the Summer Lecture Series, for luring such an incredible speaker to campus for today's session: former U.S. Secretary of Defense, Bill Perry.

John will have the honor of formally introducing Bill in just a few moments, but I simply want to say that we're delighted to have Bill with us today to speak about the dangers of nuclear proliferation, a topic that deeply impacts our national security and to which Bill has dedicated the great majority of his 65-year career.

At our last film, and before our traditional closing lunch, Roger's groupies thanked him for not only sharing his love and knowledge of movies, but also for wearing his heart on his sleeve every Thursday morning as we got to know this special

person. His love of the movies and Audrey Hepburn is second only to his love of his family and new puppy! We also thanked our wonderful and devoted class representative, Barbara Perry.

Oh, how we will miss our Thursday morning movies and the humor, wit, and wisdom of Roger Feldman.
